1 Pioneer Memorial Building, Pavilion and Monument Plaza

The park began here! This is the site of the famous 1843 vote to form the first government in the Northwest; it's also where the Hudson's Bay granary stood, before floodwaters destroyed it in the great flood of 1861. The monument was erected in 1901, followed by the Pioneer Memorial Building in 1918.

2 Pioneer Mothers Memorial Cabin and Robert Newell House Museum

The log cabin, built along the river in 1931 as a museum, was saved from erosion and rebuilt at this location. The reconstructed 1850s Newell House represents an appealing home of the era. The museum complex includes a mid-19th century school and a jail. Both museums are operated by the Daughters of the American Revolution, and have separate entrance fees. 503-678-5537 or newellhouse.com

3 Visitor Center and Store

Champoeg's past comes alive here, with free exhibits, videos, and other information. Check out the unique, memorable items at the store—great gifts, books, and more. You can purchase 12 and 24-month parking permits here, plus membership to the Friends of Historic Champoeg. Open daily except Thanksgiving and Christmas. 503-678-1251 x 221

4 Donald and Felicite Manson Farmstead

The barn and garden area, built by the Mansons in the 1850s and 60s, is the heart of Champoeg's living history program. Costumed performers depict life as it was back then, showcasing the 1862 barn, a stunning 1860s-style kitchen garden, and an apple orchard with varieties found in

the 1850s. Tour the garden on your own, or join a ranger-led tour. Ask at the Visitor Center for details.

5 Historic Butteville Store

The oldest continuously-operating store in Oregon dates to 1863. Operated by Oregon State Parks, the store is a welcome rest stop, offering ice cream, cold drinks, snacks and coffee. Check park flyers for seasonal hours or visit oregonstateparks.org





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
