



Trails

Trail of Ten Falls – The entire 8.7-mile route takes you above, behind and around 10 stunning waterfalls. Shorter loops are approximately 2.5 and 5 and 7 miles. Plan three to five hours for the full hike. Check the trail map for more detail.

Trails for Hiking, Horseback Riding, and Mountain Biking – Silver Falls has more than 35 miles of multiple-use trails. Please observe restrictions marked on trails and show courtesy to other users.

Bike Trail – A 4-mile paved bike path links the campground with the South Falls Historic District. It passes near the South Falls Lodge and then parallels the Rim Trail and crosses Highway 214 before taking a loop around a large meadow and returning back the same way.

Hiking with Children

Plan ahead and keep a close eye on children. Trails are steep and can be muddy and slippery. The terrain drops off sharply from the trail in areas. Trails are not suitable for strollers.

Visiting with Your Pet

For the safety of both hikers and pets, pets are not permitted on the Canyon, Maple Ridge, or Winter Trails. They are allowed on leashes (max 6') on the Rim Trail, Bike Path and 25 miles of backcountry trails. An off-leash pet exercise area is located in the South Falls Day-use Area. Please keep your dog under voice control and dispose properly of waste.

Reminders

Stay on the Trail. Taking shortcuts causes erosion and can harm plants and wildlife.

Bears and cougars are among many species of wildlife that make Silver Falls home. Awareness pamphlets are available at the campground booth, South Falls Lodge and park office. Please report sightings to park staff.

Take only pictures, leave only footprints. It is unlawful to pick or dig any plants and to harass or capture wild animals. Please do not carve or write on signs, trees, rocks, or park structures. To preserve the beauty of Silver Falls, pack out all of your trash; there are no garbage cans on the trails.

Campfires are only allowed in the park's enclosed metal fire rings due to the danger of forest fires.

Restrooms are located in the parking areas. No restrooms are on any trails.

Swimming is permitted in the South Falls Day-use Area, but is unsupervised. With the exception of the Upper North Falls, all other access to the water is closed from 300 feet above and below the falls.

Day-use Parking Fees: Parking for the day is \$5 per vehicle. Pay stations are at many trailheads and all booths. Parking is included with a current camping receipt, valid during the length of your stay. Annual and two-year parking passes are sold at the park office, camping registration booth, the South Falls Nature Store and online
