A Learning Environment

With its sparkling freshwater stream, ocean frontage, and 1,756-foot mountain, Humbug Mountain has an abundance of natural resources to explore. Evening presentations and Junior Ranger activities are offered July through Labor Day.

Hike to the Summit

A scenic trail winds out of Brush Creek Canyon into an old growth forest along the north face of Humbug Mountain. The trailhead parking lot is located off U.S. 101.

About one mile in, the trail forks and takes you on a circular loop. To the east, a two-mile section begins ascending, with several switchbacks, through headland forest en route to the summit. The west trail traverses the ocean side of the mountain and goes for 1.5 miles.

Smoking in Oregon State Parks is allowed only in personal vehicles, RVs, campsites and portions of day use parks along state highways that are designated as safety rest areas by the Oregon Department of Transportation. Follow the Coast Trail

A portion of the 360-mile Oregon Coast Trail winds through Humbug Mountain State Park. From Battle Rock City Park in Port Orford, the trail follows the beach to Rocky Point where it crosses U.S. 101 and continues along the Old Coast Hwy 101. A hiker-biker camp offers an overnight stop. The Oregon Coast Trail continues to the day-use area and along U.S. 101 south to Euchre Creek and the beach. The day-use area, which is located at the south end of the park, has picnic facilities with a covered gazebo.

More to See


Port Orford and the vicinity offer activities for everyone. Beachcombers and rockhounds can find agates, driftwood, seashells, and even Japanese glass floats. Scuba diving and surfing also lure visitors. Fresh and saltwater fishing can yield cod, halibut, sole, salmon, smelt, trout, and steelhead.

Port Orford Heads State Park features the historic Coast Guard Lifeboat Station Museum. Tours are offered April through October; call 541-332-0521 for current schedules and information. Spectacular views of offshore rocks and sheltered coves are visible from the hiking trails on the oceanside bluff.

Paradise Point and Tseriadun State Recreation Sites both offer beach access and ocean views extending from Port Orford Heads to Cape Blanco.

Cape Blanco State Park, nine miles north of Port Orford, offers year-round camping near the historic Cape Blanco Lighthouse, the westernmost and oldest standing lighthouse on the Oregon coast. The park is also the site of the historic Hughes House, built for a 19th-century rancher. Tours are offered April through October. Call for current information and schedules: Cape Blanco Lighthouse, 541-332-2207; Hughes House, 541-332-0248.


Arizona Beach State Recreation Site, six miles south of Humbug Mountain, offers a cozy, sandy beach sheltered by rocky headlands on each end. The park also has a fishing pond open to anglers age 17 and under. The pond is filled with rainbow





trout stocked by the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife. Youth between the ages of 14 and 17 must possess a juvenile angling license to fish. For wildlife viewing, visit the wetlands east of U.S. 101, which attract elk and a variety of waterfowl.

Gold Beach, 28 miles south of Port Orford, is the starting point for exciting jet boat rides up the famous Rogue River. Round trips last from two to seven hours. Other attractions within an hour's drive include a dinosaur garden and a wildlife park. Ask about other events and points of interest at the Port Orford Information Center at Battle Rock Park.
