Reserve early! Reserve campsites and cabins one day to nine months in advance by calling 1-800-452-5687 or visiting oregonstateparks.org. Group areas are reservable only by phone.

Farewell Bend State Recreation Area lies near the Snake River's Brownlee Reservoir, where homesteaders traveling on the historic Oregon Trail once rested and enjoyed one last look at the river before heading into the high desert.

Park Amenities

- 91 electrical sites with water
- 30 tent sites with water nearby
- C Loop open March 1–Nov. 30. A and B Loops open May 1– Oct. 31
- Hiker/biker sites
- 2 log cabins (March 1– Nov. 30)
- Group tent camp
- Picnic tables and fire rings at all sites
- Hot showers and flush toilets
- Firewood and ice available for purchase
- RV dump station
- Horseshoe pits, basketball hoop, and volleyball court
- Fish cleaning station

Universal Access

Both cabins and electrical site #46 are accessible according to the Americans with Disabilities Act and are located near accessible restrooms.

An Oregon Trail Rest Stop

After following the Snake River for 330 miles, Oregon Trail pioneers rested above the bend in the river, then bid farewell and continued their journey. Wagon ruts are still visible near the park.

Replica cover wagons sit at the park entrance. Two Oregon Trail sites are located within two miles of the park. Information is available at the registration booth. For more information, visit the Natural Historic Oregon Trail Interpretive Center on Flagstaff Hill just east of Baker City.

Cabin Camping

Stay at the park while enjoying a roof over your head by renting one of our log cabins, open March 1– Nov. 30. Each cabin is 13' X 13' with a 6-foot long porch. A full bed and two bunks with vinyl-covered mattresses sleep four people. Each has electricity, heat, and air conditioning. Cabin 1 is pet friendly.

Brownlee Reservoir

The park's boat ramp and docks lead to Brownlee Reservoir. To check on current reservoir levels, call the park at 541-869-2365 or Idaho Power at 1-800-422-3143 or visit www.idahopower.com. Brownlee Reservoir has excellent catfish, bass and crappie fishing. There is a fish-cleaning station by the boat ramp parking lot.

Nature Shows

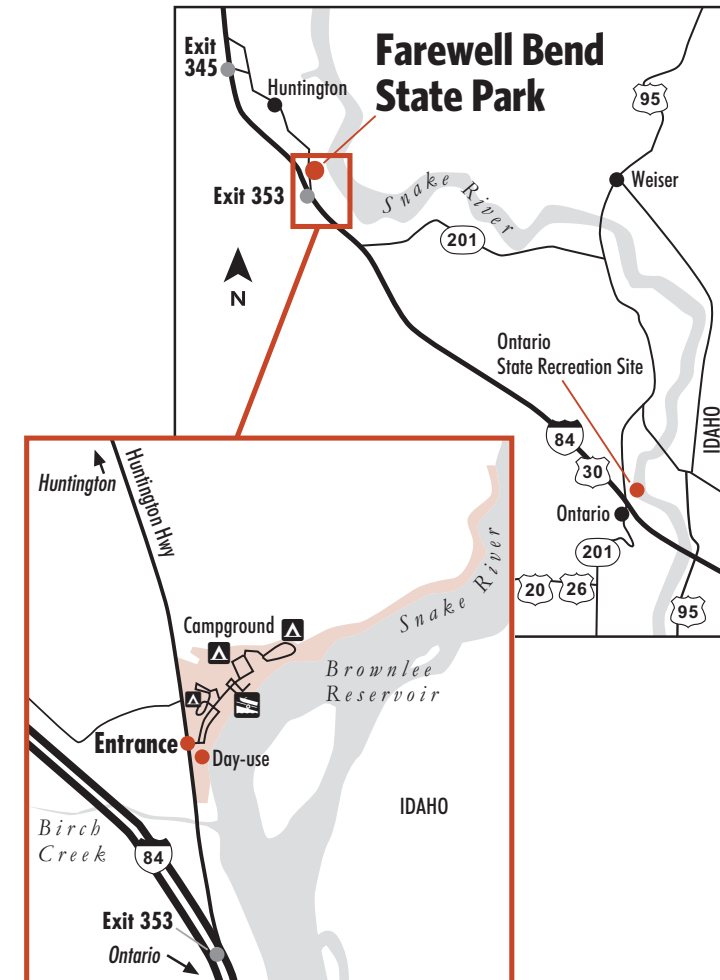
Wildflowers decorate the hillsides at Farewell Bend in the spring and summer. If you're lucky, you'll see wildlife like deer, pronghorn antelope, geese, eagles, and quail. Park staff frequently present evening interpretive programs in the summer; check with a park host for the schedule.

Visit a Frontier Town

In 1870, 14 years before the railroad arrived in the area, Miller's Stagecoach Station was established in nearby Huntington. Learn more about the town at the Huntington Museum. Information: visithuntingtonor.org.

- Campground quiet hours are between 10 p.m. and 7 a.m.

Check-in after 4 p.m., **Check-out** by 1 p.m.

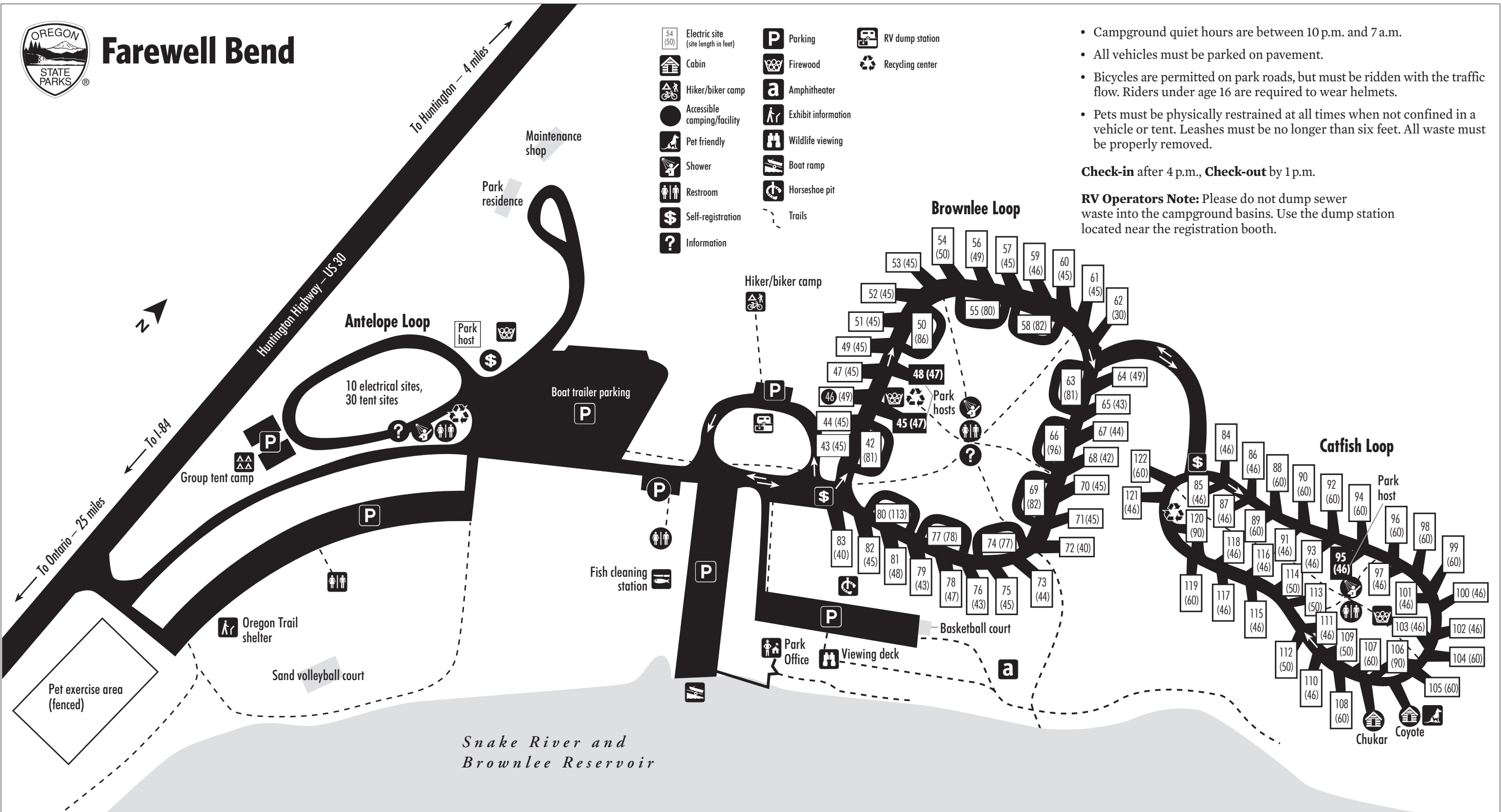
RV Operators Note: Please do not dump sewer waste into the campground basins. Use the dump station located near the registration booth.
